## ‘Reconciled Interrelationship’: Wesleyan Perspectives on God, People, and the Land

### Call for Papers:

The relationship between God, the people, and the land is a theme that appears throughout the biblical narrative. Whether it is a garden, the wilderness, green pastures, or the New Jerusalem, the land speaks of this relationship. According to Howard Snyder,

**‘God intends shalom, a harmonious, reconciled interrelationship  
between himself, his people, and the land.’**

God’s intention for creation, according to the biblical narrative, has been disrupted and diseased by sin. The original harmony we read about in Genesis 1 and 2 has been distorted, causing tension, conflict, and pain. The rest of the biblical narrative, however, describes a God who seeks the restoration of all things, made possible through the person of Jesus Christ, the sending of the Holy Spirit, and the participation of the people of God.

The relationship between God, people, and the land remains in tension: housing crises, migration, stripping of natural resources, violent campaigns to acquire more land, environmental disasters, and the continued effects of colonising land. The reconciled interrelationship is yet to find its fulfilment, but the invitation of God to participate in the healing of all of creation remains.

Papers presented at this conference will reflect on the relationship between God, people, and the land today.

## Writing your abstract

Abstracts must be no more than 250 words.

A useful abstract will include the following components:

- A clear statement of the question or issue to be addressed
- A summary of the position(s) to be presented in relation to the question or issue and/or an indication of key conclusions
- An indication of sources from which information will be drawn – key writers, research, personal experience, biblical exposition, etc.

**Note:** The submission must include a short biographical statement, containing:

- Your name
- Church, academic, professional and cultural and/or community affiliations relevant to your submission
- Any experience and/or qualifications which support your submission
- Any other information you consider of relevance for the selection panel deliberations

## Final paper

Thirty-minute presentations should be 2500 – 3000 words in length. Papers presented at the Conference may be considered for publication in a book of peer-reviewed essays derived from the Conference.

Proposals for fifteen-minute shorter presentations will also be considered from emerging scholars (students) and those who wish to make an artistic contribution on the conference theme.

The ACWR Conference is a safe and respectful space for theological conversation. It is expected that there will be a wide range of views expressed through papers and in responses from delegates. The aim of the Conference is to explore ideas rather than convince others of the rightness or otherwise of any particular position. Therefore, we are looking for presenters who are able to clearly articulate their ideas in a respectful manner, allowing space for disagreement and discussion with others. We will also be selecting papers which represent a range of views. All abstracts will remain confidential to the ACWR selection committee.
